Attendance

Thank you to all of you who try really hard to ensure your child is in school every day when they are well enough. Children can miss a lot of learning in just one day and it's really important to make sure that this doesn't happen if possible. The Importance of Attendance During Term Time

We are committed to promoting the welfare of our children through regular school attendance. We know that every day lost to education can have an impact on a child's attainment and progress in school. The link between good attendance and high levels of achievement is undeniable. Poor attendance and lateness may also be detrimental to the social adjustment and development of pupils..

Medical and Dental appointments

We request that wherever possible parents try to arrange medical and dental appointments for outside of school hours, If on the rare occasion a medical appointment during school time is unavoidable, then we would ask that your child attends school beforehand and/or returns to school immediately that same day following their appointment. If a child is absent from school first thing in the morning or immediately after lunch then they cannot receive an attendance present mark for that session.

Leave of absence

Leave of absence may only be given in exceptional circumstances such as family bereavement, or for other legitimate reasons such as an interview at another school. The absence should be restricted to the minimum time required and parents are asked to request permission in advance by filling in the leave of absence form on the website and emailing to the admin account.

Family Holidays

Parents should be aware that there is no right to time off for a family holiday. Leave of absence for any reason is only granted in exceptional circumstances and is very unlikely to be granted for the purpose of a holiday. Please do not organise family holidays during term time as we are unable to authorise this and you are likely to receive a fine.

Tyre Park

Children are welcome to play on the on the tyre park after school if they are waiting for a Club to finish (as long as it isn't chained off), but they must be supervised by parents/carers. School cannot take any responsibility for any accidents that may occur on the tyre park out of school hours (8.45am to 3.15pm). The school gates close at 4.30 Monday to Thursday and 3.30 on a Friday, please ensure that you leave the tyre park by these times. Thank you.

Respect Charter



At Great Moor Junior School

At Great Moor Junior School we believe staff, parents and children are entitled to a safe and protective environment in which to learn and work. We strive to ensure that our school offers a warm and nurturing environment. All members of the school community and visitors should demonstrate mutual respect. To feel safe and work together and use restorative approaches as the foundation of our practice. Any behaviour that may lead to feelings of harassment, alarm or distress to members of our community, will not be tolerated and action taken.

Expectations

- o That all adults set a good example to children at all times, showing them how to get along with all members of the school and the wider community.
- That no one staff, governors, parents, carers, volunteers or children, be subjected to abusive behaviour or any form of threats from visitors on the school premises.
- That physical attacks and threatening behaviour, abusive or insulting language verbal or written (including on social media), to staff, governors, parents, carers, volunteers, children and other users of the school premises will not be tolerated and may lead to a ban from school premises and/or police action.

Types of behaviour that are considered serious and unacceptable

This is not an exhaustive list but seeks to provide illustrations of such behaviour.

- Shouting, either in person or over the telephone.
- Speaking in an aggressive/threatening tone
- Physically intimidating , e.g. standing very close
- The use of aggressive hand gestures/exaggerated movements
- Physical threats
- Shaking or holding a fist towards another person
- Swearing and name calling
- Pushing
- Slapping, punching, hitting or kicking
- Racist, homophobic or other hateful behaviour
- Sexist comments or sexual innuendo
- Disrespecting religion or belief
- Inappropriate posting on Social Networking sites which could bring the school into disrepute or be deemed as bullying, harassment or a hate- related comment

The school reserves the right to take any necessary actions to ensure that members of the school community are not subjected to any form of abuse in line with policy and procedure.
